University of Queensland Press ISBN 0702233374 138 pages There is a strength and warmth in this multi-layered exploration of a child forming new relationships after her parents' marriage breakdown. Rain and her mother make a new life in a country town next door to Daniel, the clever neighbour who keeps a Star Trek diary and is marginalised at school because of his eccentricities. Rain's acerbic comments on life, divorce, stepmothers and estranged fathers enliven a clever story on the nature of friendship. Whilst the e cummings quotations require correction, this is a jewel of a book with beautifully rounded characters portrayed with insight and gentle humour.

Runestone is an entertaining fantasy, with young protagonists and an interesting setting. Thora, the spellworker's daughter, and Oddo, the farmer's son, were swapped at birth, so that each has skills inappropriate to their family trades. The magical runestone discovered by Oddo seems to hold answers to solving problems, but the stone is more mystical and powerful than imagined. Thora and Oddo are a competent, feisty pair who learn through cooperation to deal with the many difficulties they encounter. Rune messages enliven the story, enticing the reader to work out their coded meanings.

This simple, well-constructed story celebrates differences. Molly and Simon prove that you should fight for what you believe in, when they tackle the terrifying flying fox and rescue an 'endangered' possum. Fast-paced and believable, this story has just the right balance of excitement, emotion and peer group relationships.

FIENBERG, Anna HORRENDO'S CURSE Illustrated by Kim GAMBLE Allen & Unwin ISBN 1 86508 603 7 156 pages Horrendo, a reviled misfit, 'cursed' never to say or do an unkind word or deed, lives where parents raise their sons to be rude and horrible. During his traditional two-year apprenticeship as a pirate, he causes unrest with his niceness and gourmet cooking skills. Slapstick humour with affirmations of friendship and teamwork dilute the violence and cruelty of the pirates' behaviour. Although right overcomes rottenness, Fienberg retains some traces of piratical villainy: the Captain is rotten to the end. The language is lively, full of colourful epithets, imagery and challenging vocabulary. Kim Gamble's illustrations capture the whimsy of the plot and the grottiness of the pirates.

Winning is a blend of two themes: friendship threatened by sporting rivalry and parent pressure to win at all costs.
